Holland's Heros:

How HTS students are getting inspired by their role models.

When you walk through the front door of Holland Township School, you may notice many faces scattered all over the walls outside of the cafeteria.

The people on the walls live different lives, and most of them have never interacted. These people covering the walls are the heroes of HTS students.

The Hero Project, as it has been called, asked students from Holland for two things: 3 printed out pictures of their heroes, and the reasons why they chose them.

The hope for the project is to empower students by encouraging them to recognize everyday heroes, and to recognize the hero in themselves. The project was also meant to foster a better sense of belonging and kindness in the school.

The leader of the project is Mr. Michael Spence. Mr. Spence is hoping to help create a positive environment at Holland Township School.

"I want to improve the culture of the school, and show that not all superheroes wear capes," Mr. Spence stated. When asked about the results of the Hero Project, he stated "I love it actually. I love the outreach, and the outcome."

A majority of the wall is made of parents, grandparents, other family members, musicians, and actors. But what surprised both Mr. Spence and Mrs. Snyder the most was seeing Holland's own teachers on the wall.

"I believe I saw someone put a teacher up there. There's actually a handful of teachers. You don't put your name by your hero, so the fact that these students brought their teachers in, and identified someone in their building as a hero, speaks to the culture and the impact that the staff is leaving on the kids here," Mr. Spence said.

When Mrs. Snyder was asked, she had a similar response

"Similar to Mr. Spence I'm super excited about the response. I mean, we thought that we were going to fill one small bulletin board and we filled the hallway, and it continues to be an inspiration when parents are here in the building. They stop with their children and they recognize the heroes, and I see someone new up there every day that I didn't notice before. Whether it's a grandparent, a teacher, or an administrator. Even Mr Spence is up there."

Of course, not everyone brought in pictures. When Mr. Spence was asked about how he felt about that, his response was surprisingly optimistic.


"I would say I felt discouraged at that point, but you know it's expected. I think that what I love is seeing other students hold their peers accountable; so in that bag I don't believe in loss, I believe in lessons. They're [the pictures] still a lesson for the kids to learn, and watching them [learn that lesson] is just as good as all the students bringing it in."

Aside from the Hero Project, Mr. Spence also has his sights set on other goals to continue to make Holland a better place.

"I want to continue to improve the culture alongside Mrs. Snyder and the amazing staff. I want to continue to just build with the kids and have great relationships. When I first walked into Holland, I was the tall black man that looked like LeBron James to them, and now it brings joy to my heart when I see kids say 'Hey Mr. Spence, hold up your hand to see how high I can reach'. But the kids don't really recognize that I'm just as excited to see them. I never have, no matter what is going on during my days at Holland, had a bad day. I never have bad days, so I love that part."

When speaking with Mr. Spence, it's easy to see why Mrs. Snyder chose him to help continue to build a strong culture at Holland.

"His history and background is fascinating to me, because he truly rose above what life gave him and is an inspiration. I learn from him everyday. Just from the first conversation that I had, he started to teach me things that I was not aware of, and just ignorant to. People who I respect highly just spoke volumes of his character, and that's why he's here, and he's awesome. I think that most people agree." Mrs. Snyder said.

Mr. Spence has already made an impact on the school. I'm sure a lot of us are wondering "What's next for the Hero Project?"

"We will continue to actually build on the Hero In Me program, and for the next couple months we're going to speak on the superpowers that Heroes have, such as character, leadership, kindness, gentleness, and courageousness. But we are also going to get into the community service aspect of it, where we are going to just continue to give back. As you know we gave cards to children who are in the hospital and we also get cards to the community leaders and First Responders in our community, so we are going to continue to speak to that community service aspect." Mr. Spence said.

I think that in the end, Mr. Spence was able to perfectly summarize his goals for our school and our community in one sentence "We want to make sure that when people think of Holland, they don't think of a school, they think of a town that's together, on one page."





Mr. Parenti said that above all else, "Flushing the toilets and washing your hands. That would save me a million."
